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Māla Māunuunu

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KE KULA NUI KAIĀULU 'O KAPI'OLAN

Māla Māunuunu is a Native Hawaiian dryland garden at Kapi'olani Community College. It is home to endemic, indigenous, and endangered flora of Hawai'i, as well as the introduced Polynesian canoe plants that sustained the Hawaiian people for thousands of years and continue to sustain us today. This site has been in cultivation since 2008 by the collective limahana (working hands) of students, faculty, staff, and the community of KCC. Māla Māunuunu provides provisional, educational, and cultural resources through engaging kanaka (people) with Hawai'i's unique flora. This māla serves as a medium for 'āina based learning for a variety of disciplines to better understand Hawaiian culture and language, ecological knowledge, and environmental kinship through traditional farming.

Kūlia Ma Kapi'olani

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The overarching goal for the Kūlia ma Kapi'olani project is to kāko'o (to uphold, support) Native Hawaiian students to be competitive in high-skill, high-wage, and high-demand occupations, through rigorous Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs while maintaining their identity as kānaka. Successful progress through the established pathways enable students to achieve degrees and certificates leading to livable wages,

dispelling the historical disparity in the economic status of the Hawaiian community.

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The Lunalilo Scholars Program is an opportunity for noncollege bound students to transform their lives through education. The program was designed to uniquely serve and support students who demonstrate academic potential, but lack the family and financial support to attend college. Students of Native Hawaiian ancestry are given preference to also support the College in increasing the number of Native Hawaiian students that enroll and complete the first year of college.
